## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

2022-2023 has seen an acceleration towards meeting the requirements, aims and objectives of the 2022-2025 Business Plan.

Primary objectives for Neighbourhood Watch Scotland (NWS) remain:

- Encourage community spirit, better connections and capacity to improve safety and resilience, by engaging with all communities in Scotland
- Ensure that NWS members feel valued, are more confident about staying safe and have a reduced fear of crime
- Enable Scottish Communities to be better informed, safer and more resilient by having a robust Neighbourhood Watch network.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

Up until the arrival of the newly appointed Director, our progress remained set against two key principles – 'Your Watch Your Way' and 'getting the right information to the right people at the right time' - which provided a flexible approach to neighbourhood watch at a community level and focuses on building community resilience.

Following the Directors appointment our mission and vision has changed and is now Safer Neighbourhoods, Stronger Communities. Neighbourhood Watch Scotland will:

- Collaborate with partners to develop community resilience.
- Grow partner and community use of Neighbourhood Alert and Scotland's Neighbourhood Watch network.
- Enhance a sense of wellbeing by encouraging community cohesion.

NWS along with various partners share delivery of the Scottish Government's Building Safer Communities Programme.

Achievements under each of the key objectives were:

We will use all forms of engagement to ensure that people throughout Scotland are better informed, better connected and have the capacity to contribute to the safety and resilience of their community.

- Neighbourhood Watch Scotland has been meeting and engaging directly with community meetings.
  This is an important and key role of NWS. We have also adapted to the use of virtual technology to
  maintain regular contact with all our key partners and, when possible, have also joined community
  based meetings remotely. We have maintained regular contact with our members, communities and
  partners. Social media and more importantly Neighbourhood Alert, has allowed a platform for ongoing
  community engagement and support.
- There are currently 29,867 direct individuals and 2,031 Community Groups registered on the Neighbourhood Alert system.
- The Neighbourhood Alert system plays a key role in providing locally relevant, targeted, timeous and trusted information. It is currently administered by local police and local partner administrators across Scotland, who together, with NWS staff, have sent 345 Alerts over the period, equating to over 3.8m individual emails to recipients. Based on average propagation rates it can be confidently estimated that just over 11.5m people received this information.

- Since April 2022 Neighbourhood Alert has allowed key information to be distributed directly to communities across Scotland on a range of issues related to crime, safety and resilience.
- NWS hosted 2 webinars during Cyber Scotland Week 2023 for Police Scotland on basic cyber security aimed specifically at communities and home use. Over 100 individuals from across Scotland attended the events.
- Neighbourhood Watch Scotland continues to distribute their well-regarded and popular Safer Neighbourhoods Stronger Communities booklets (the booklet formerly known as Safer Communities Safer Scotland). A further 11,000 copies were printed in March 2023. These booklets continue to be distributed to new and existing Watches, plus partners. The e-copy is also made available on request and via the NWS website.
- Work continues on the Neighbourhood Watch Scotland website to develop further in terms of its content
  and connectivity as part of the ongoing work of the NWS Communications Group. The website includes
  a community contact form which has again proved really useful as another route for contacting the NWS
  Team. A "visit our shop" function has also been added to assist with the ordering and purchase of NWS
  products.
- As a further part of the above external communications review work is ongoing at improving NWS use, reach and content of current social media platforms to make best use to support both our communities and our partners.
- A key part of NWS values is encouraging communities to look out for each other and this has been especially key during the last year where we have seen local volunteers support communities.
- NWS has developed a solid and trusted foundation with limited resource. Partners continue to show
  increasing interest in the NWS targeted approach and focus of bringing communities together, building
  community resilience and encouraging communities to look out for each other with regards to matters
  of crime, resilience and safety. Partner engagement and specific initiatives have resulted in further
  training for Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS), Police Scotland and some local authority Trading
  Standards representatives in use of the Alert system.
- NWS actively promotes the regular Trading Standards Scotland (TSS) Scam Share and Scottish Government (SG) Cyber crime bulletins via Alert platform. NWS also respond directly to community feedback from these Alerts and feedback any intelligence to the relative authorities.
- NWS supported the annual "Shut Out Scammers Campaign" by attending local events and sharing content on social media platforms in April 2022.
- NWS continue to support all Community Safety Partnership campaigns.
- NWS regularly attend and provide training inputs to the Safer Communities Training at the Scottish Police College.

## People in Neighbourhood Watch areas are more confident about staying safe and have a reduced fear of crime.

- During 2022 a Neighbourhood Alert survey was carried out and completed by 3,079 Alert users. This
  survey was similar to the previous ones carried out, results shown below will act as a direct comparison
  and measurement.
- 20.4% of all Scottish users responded (the highest response within the UK) and analysis found:
  - 82% of respondents agreed that Alerts were informative
  - 91% of respondents agreed that Alerts were important
  - 80% of respondents strongly agreed that Alerts were timely
  - 89% of respondents felt that the Alert system is safe and secure
  - 62% of respondents said they had changed their behaviour as a result of the messages
  - 47% of respondents reported an increase in Police confidence
  - **80%** of respondents found it easier to spot a scam
  - 1,968 respondents directly stated that the information contained in Alerts had helped prevent them becoming a victim of crime.

#### Scottish communities are more resilient having a sustainable Neighbourhood Watch Network.

- The establishment of a sustainable neighbourhood watch network brings benefit to not only individual communities but a very broad range of partners and service deliverers. Partnership working is key to the sustainability of neighbourhood watch and therefore remains a key priority for NWS.
- Due to data cleansing during the period April 2022 March 2023 there has been a decrease overall of NW membership although 89 formal NW schemes have been established during the year. Neighbourhood Watch Scotland continue to enjoy the success of the more flexible approach of 'Your Watch, Your Way'. All registered community group co-ordinators/administrators have declared their combined community reach to be 205,771 households.
- A specific area of growth has been within rural and remote communities with **10,052**. This has seen a specific growth of **40%** in the last year.
- A key focus of work carried out over the period was through the Scottish Partnership Against Rural Crime (SPARC) and local partnerships against rural crime. Rural Watch Scotland is a key component of this work in the development of local Rural Crime Partnerships as indeed is the Alert platform for localised messaging to our communities via these partnerships.
- Emerging issues are identified through these local partnerships but increasingly include visitor management, fly tipping, dirty camping as well as the related impact of rural crime.
- A primary role for Neighbourhood Watch Scotland is to encourage and support local connectivity within communities, and between communities, and their local service providers. Having good trusted relationships with key partners allow us to do this.
- Construction Watch Scotland was launched in partnership with Police Scotland on 23rd March 2022 to
  enhance awareness between construction and trade industries, as well as police, to ensure intelligence
  relating to criminal or suspicious activity at one location is quickly provided to others along with prevention
  advice.
- Construction Watch Scotland has been devised in partnership by Police Scotland and Neighbourhood Watch Scotland. It follows a rise in the thefts of plant equipment, tools and stored fuel and is supported by the Scotlish Business Resilience Centre, Secured By Design and Crimestoppers.
- The new Construction Watch Scotland platform currently has 61 registered users.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

Those present at the NWS Annual General Meeting, held on 16<sup>th</sup> November 2022, appointed Brett Nicholls Associates as the Independent Examiner for the year ahead.

- All NWS Funds are unrestricted.
- Cash in hand and in the bank on 31 March 2023 represents the NWS reserves, a designated fund held
  for the growth and development of Neighbourhood Alert and an acceptable cushion to absorb future
  deficits and the reinvest in NWS's service.
- No discrepancies were found with the NWS accounts for 2022 2023.
- For the period 2022 2023 it was projected that the core operating costs would be circa £160,000.00.
   Minor changes were made to the budget lines, with Board approval, such as employing new staff members, purchasing merchandise and new fliers, as well as hosting in person meetings. These costs were offset against partnership development and small savings on various budget lines throughout the year.

Throughout the financial year NWS continually review their budget to ensure it is efficiently and effectively applied in support of its charitable activities and provides maximum public benefit.

#### Reserves policy

Reserves at the year end are £69,282 (2022: £61,662). An unrestricted reserve of £69,282, represents five months reserves which is considered to be sufficient to deal with the operational contingencies of NWS and also allow any new development opportunities to be capitalised upon.

#### **Financial Position**

The charity generated a surplus of £7,620 (2022: £3,421).

The charity's financial position is relatively secure, with unrestricted free reserves of £57,037 carried forward at 31 March 2023 (2022: £47,662). In addition the charity holds a designated fund of £12,245 (2022: £14,000) for the Neighbourhood Alert license fee.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

NWS submitted an application form and business case to Scottish Government in April 2023, reflecting the aspirations and outcomes based on the 3 year Business Plan 2022-2025, and will continue working towards meeting the aims and objectives set out within.

With the appointment of new Director Lesley Clark, the charity has seen changes being made operationally and strategically.

With the recent appointment of a Data Administrator, Engagement Officer and Policy Development Officer critical projects can now be carried out such as:

- Data cleanse of the Neighbourhood Alert system to ensure Watches and Alert users information is removed as necessary to comply with GDPR regulations.
- All policies and procedures being updated and created ensuring health and safety and HR compliance.
- Ensure business resilience within the current Neighbourhood Watch Scotland team.

To create a number of baseline figures for reporting purposes, VISAV will carry out their annual survey to all Coordinators, members and Alert users to gauge responses. Each year a similar survey is conducted which helps gauge how much of an impact NWS and Alerts are making within communities across Scotland.

Social media is an important tool in promoting NWS throughout Scotland, reaching audiences we would not normally have access to, such as those in hard to reach communities. Our Board is keen we create a Communications Strategy and Calendar over the year to clarify the relationships between audiences, messages, channels, activities, and materials. To coincide with getting the NWS messaging correct and consistent we will shortly begin looking at plan to create a new website. The site will be user friendly, easy to navigate around and less content heavy, which should encourage new users to our site and Alert. The social media work and new website has been on the project list for over a year due to limited staff resources. The Board and Director are looking to establish a Digital Services Group to take forward all means of communication.

NWS aims to raise the profile and increase visibility through local engagement as well as providing advice and support on local issues or concerns our communities are dealing with. This helps us develop trusting relationships, community wellbeing and public reassurance.

As we now have Construction Watch Scotland, Rural Watch Scotland and Neighbourhood Watch Scotland, we will continue to seek new Neighbourhood Alert Administrators to promote the Alert system and encourage new sign ups, as well as circulating Alert messages with local information and providing advice on issues. This type of messaging is crucial to those within urban and rural locations as well as the construction industry.

Over the year we will hope to enhance our partnership working whilst continuing to work with partners and Board members to maximise community reach and resources.

Once policies and procedures are updated NWS will then be in a strong position to advertise for volunteers and advocates to assist in their local communities encouraging new membership and bringing together associations.

The data cleanse will continue to ensure the Neighbourhood Alert system is up to date with Watches. Once all Watch coordinator data has been completed, the Data Administrator will look to create a Coordinators group to assist in various aspects of NWS business, for example new sign ups are supplied with tools and resources to ensure they are confident running their Watch as well as maintaining interest in their scheme as they move forward.

NWS is looking to appoint a Professional Fundraiser to allow NWS to undertake various projects to take the charity forward, bringing it up to date and diminishing the "curtain twitcher" reputation. For example, help encourage Neighbourhood Watch members to contribute to the safety of their community and themselves through roadshows, regional forums, online drop-ins and a monthly coordinator bulletin.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

**Governing document** 

The charity is controlled by its governing document, and is constituted as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland SCIO (SC036510) is registered with OSCR and is recognised by the Inland Revenue as a Scottish Charity. Neighbourhood Watch Scotland SCIO became a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation on the 1st of December 2011.

The object of Neighbourhood Watch Scotland SCIO shall be to promote good citizenship and greater public participation in the prevention and solution of crime and other risks, intentional or unintentional, so that effective liaison between public service providers and the public can be achieved, thus promoting the efficiency of the services across Scotland.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Member Charity Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of Neighbourhood Watch Scotland SCIO and hold office for a maximum of three years when they become subject to a retirement clause. Member Charity Trustees can seek re-election after the three-year period.

Co-opted Trustees can be elected and retired by the Board at any time.

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland will continue to review and develop their trustee structure to ensure appropriate representation and required skills are available to the organisation.

Organisational structure

In accordance with the existing Constitution the maximum number of Trustees is 12, half must be registered with an active neighbourhood watch group or any individual who wishes to further the purposes of the charity. The Board comprises office bearer roles of Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and Treasurer. The role of Secretary is currently vacant.

Trustees meet every three months, or more often if required. Decisions are taken at these meetings by a majority vote, following discussion.

Day to day decisions are made by the NWS Director.

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland currently employs six persons to manage the day to day running of the organisation.

Induction and training of trustees

Trustees are provided with an induction session and accompanying paperwork which includes information on:

- The organisation and its aims and objectives
- The responsibilities of being a Trustee
- OSCR's Trustee guidelines

**Board development** 

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland The Neighbourhood Watch Scotland Board remained with the same members throughout 2022 – 2023 although we sadly lost a few due to them stepping down. Each new member brings their own skill set which continues to develop the organisation going forward.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is one member of key management, the Director. Total employer costs related to this post in 2022-23 were £28,200 (2021-22: £29,010).

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland ("the charity") is a Scottish charitable incorporated organisation governed by its Constitution. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC036510) on 1 December 2011. Its registered address is Enterprise House, Springkerse Business Park, Stirling, FK7 7UF.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities:
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment - 25% on cost

#### **Stocks**

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

Neighbourhood Watch Scotland is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
