We had a great day at Rutherglen Exchange

Shopping Centre, Glasgow with Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators from Springhall and Cathkin Neighbourhood Watch and Manor Way Neighbourhood Watch area and local officers from Police Scotland carrying out a Community Safety Awareness Day. There was great interest from shoppers within the local community, some of whom were already part of a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, which was excellent to hear.





NWS staff attended Waverley Train Station along with partners from Network Rail, ScotRail, British Transport Police Scotland and SFRS for a joint event to highlight White Ribbon Scotland, and raise awareness of the 16 days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence. We were able to support colleagues from White Ribbon Scotland to engage with a number of commuters within the train station, including members of the University of Edinburgh Basketball Club, who kindly stopped for a photograph after showing support for White Ribbon Scotland by signing the pledge. We had lots of fun at Central and Queen Street Train Stations in Glasgow and Waverley Train Station in Edinburgh with partners from Police Scotland including the Business Crime Prevention Unit, British Transport Police Scotland, ScotRail's Travel Safe Team, Network Rail and Trading Standards Scotland, Local Authority Trading Standards and SFRS with lots of interest from commuters.

Look out for our next joint campaign involving the rail network early 2024.

NWS worked in collaboration with Police Scotland on a local radio campaign in Abercleen (Original 106fm) which sought to increase awareness and vigilance regarding scams and frauds, particularly using social media and telephone calls. Spotlight on **Rural events**

Our rural communities were also very much a focus of our activities and NWS staff teamed up with the Scottish Partnership Against Rural Crime (SPARC), who we work with collaboratively to prevent, tackle and reduce rural crime, throughout Scotland.

SPARC is a multi-agency partnership involving key organisations, such as NWS who collectively work together.

We began the summer with a stall at the Royal Highland Agricultural Show. Then in September, NWS staff joined Police Scotland in the Scottish Borders to launch 'Rural Crime Week.'

NWS staff were also at the Greater Glasgow Partnership Against Rural Crime (GGPARC) Safety and Security event held in October 2023 at the Donald Malcolm Heritage Centre, Renfrewshire. During the event they teamed up with a number of



organisations, who along with security and first aid organisations carried out practical demonstrations and provided information and advice on a variety of topics including scams, security, theft, road safety, working in a safe environment, first aid trauma and casualty care. It was great to see so many families and children at the event. Our 2024 rural events have kicked off already, with a splendid day at the Bankfoot Community Centre, Perth. It was the first outing for our newest team member Lyndsay, in her role as Engagement Officer.

It was a great opportunity for her to meet other stakeholders from the British Horse Society Scotland, Perth & Kinross Council, NFU Scotland, Scottish Land & Estates and Forestry & Land Scotland.

AGM Update

The beginning of a new year is always a good time to think about freshening ideas and revisiting priorities. As part of a notional spring clean we ask our coordinators to think about hosting a:

- Stop and listen event This could be a membership survey, questionnaire or board blast meeting to explore thoughts and views on the positive aspects of the neighbourhood and explore any new challenges. This is a great way to identify your local problems and consider any potential resolutions. In addition it will allow you to understand your strengths, skills and assets and generate ideas to help you tap into local funding opportunities that might be available in your area.
- Stop and look event: This involves a walk through of your neighbourhood watch area to determine any issues of concern including any repairs needed and potential quick fix solutions to signage, public lighting, pavements, street furniture etc.
- Be socially active: Think about what you could do to help enhance your local environment. This could involve an organised litter pick, park tidy or paint and repair event. There is always something to be done, and improving our public space helps everyone. Depending on where you live, local businesses may be keen to help.

Adverse weather

January 2024 has already seen some very challenging weather conditions for us across Scotland and spring is still some time away. But looking ahead there are things that we can all do to help reduce the impact on our home and on our personal safety when out and about.

Some safety tips from Ready Scotland include:

- Being proactive by securing loose outdoor objects around your property (e.g. trampolines, guttering, pipes, roof tiles, bins and fences).
- Remember to check on the safety of vulnerable friends or neighbours – they may need assistance or support to take precautionary measures.

If you have to travel in adverse driving conditions, give yourself extra time and take a winter car kit (a warm jacket, boots and a blanket, snacks). Plan the route ahead – conditions can change unexpectedly.

Recreational walkers should also plan ahead, be prepared for the weather conditions and ensure they tell someone of their planned route and expected

- timings. If walking by the coast be careful of large waves and spray.
- Think about where you park (e.g. if windy, park away from trees and walls).
- Maintain home supplies of essential food, bottled water and any medication needed for your family and pets.

Sign Up For SP Energy Networks FREE Priority Services Register

We are partnering with SP Energy Networks to encourage you to sign up to the free Priority Services Register (PSR) which offers additional support in the unlikely event of a power cut

The free service provides extra support to customers across Central and Southern Scotland who feel they need its help during power cuts. This can include people who are over the age of 60, have children under the age of 5, have a chronic illness or mobility issues.

Being on the PSR doesn't mean SP Energy Networks can restore your power any quicker, but it does mean they will let you know what's happening if they know of a problem in your area and can help you get through it. You can benefit from proactive and ongoing contact during known power interruptions and access to a dedicated welfare line during storms. When registered, you will also have access to additional support services, including dementia support, help for carers and home fire safety visits. For an extra layer of security, you can set up a password with SP Energy Networks to safeguard against bogus callers. Information on the PSR can be requested in various formats, including braille and large print and text relay services are available in partnership with SignLive, ensuring accessibility for those who are hard of hearing or have speech impairments. Kendal Morris, Customer Service Director at SP Energy Networks said: "Our customers are at the heart of everything we do and we know how important it is to support those who might need a bit more help in the unlikely event of a power cut. "While our engineering teams work around the clock to restore electricity as guickly as possible when there are any issues, they are supported by an unseen army of customer service colleagues who make sure our customers know they are our priority. "Whether it's people with medical dependencies on electrical equipment or households with young children, we're there to offer a helping hand when it's needed most".
